

Suggestions

 Don't panic! Don't rush into speaking. Some participants in debate may not be able to follow your argument.



 Try to speak accurately and clarify what the main point in your argument is.

What happens if appropriate accent and intonation patterns are missing?

A possibility: The meaning of a statement employed for your argument changes.



Examples:

(A) Medical schools should train their new doctors just as *Ikyoku* (a medical department) used to do.

(B) Do you agree with the education and science ministry's plans? Yes.
